Abstract. The abstract should summarize the contents of the paper. It should be clear, descriptive, self-explanatory, a single paragraph and not too long. It should contain no references. It should also be suitable for publication in abstracting services.

Keywords. Camera ready manuscript, L^AT_EX 2_ε, book, style

Introduction

Note that this section, along with **References**, **Acknowledgements** and any **Appendix** sections are *unnumbered*.

This document was prepared with L^AT_EX 2_ε, using the ‘cpa2013’ class file. See the L^AT_EX source file ‘template.tex’ for how to set this up.

1. Special Points for CPA-2013

1.1. Author Information

If author affiliations are the same, there is no need to use super-scripted markers. For example:

If (as in the above) there is room for full address(es), there is no need for the footnote below giving the full contact details for one *Correspondence Author*. Note the email addresses are set in a small typewriter font when included as part of the contact info — looks better than a normal sized version. Note also the use of explicit spacing in places, in particular separating the authors from “and”, and, between the address and email (4 points).

1.2. Running Headers

Note the special header for this title page. Do not change it! Subsequent pages have running middle headers that are set by:

where the *running title* is a shortened (if necessary) form of the paper title. The example given for *running author* is the pattern to use for three or more authors. For two authors:

```
\runningauthor{A.B.Author and P.Q.Other}
```

and for one author:

```
\runningauthor{A.B.Author}
```

For fragments of program code, it is recommended that you comment out the line:

```
%\usepackage[T1]{fontenc}
```

and add (in the preamble):

```
\renewcommand{\ttdefault}{cmtt}
```

This gives a more pleasant typewriter font.

1.3. Your CPA-2013 Page Budget

Your final paper should have the right number of pages for its content. There is no general budget, though the editor may have special concerns for each paper as a result of referees' reports. You may assume that your first page number will be odd — i.e. that your paper will start on a right-hand page in the proceedings.

If your paper is accepted, one of the Proceedings editors will be nominated to work with you towards your producing final camera-ready copy, taking into account the feedback from the referees (and all the style guidelines in this document). Please keep your editor regularly informed of progress during this very important stage. As soon as possible, please mail:

the number of pages in your final copy.

1.4. Submitting Final Camera-ready Copy

You must email *your nominated editor* and the address given in Section 1.3 a gzipped tar-ball containing the PDF of your camera-ready copy *and all sources needed to re-generate it*. These sources include all .tex, .cls, .eps etc. files used, including the cpa2013.cls file.

1.5. Header Capitalisation

All section, sub-section, sub-sub-section (etc.) headers should be capitalised as shown in this document. Use initial capitals for all words other than articles (a, an, the), conjunctions (and, or, not) and prepositions (at, from, to) — unless one is the first word in a heading. Note: these rules also apply to the main paper title and (shortened) running-header title.

2. Short Head One

2.1. Figures

Dic nam esta pulchra ut luna electa, ut sol replet laetitia terras, caelos. Maria virgo illa dulcis, praedicata de propheta porta orientalis (see Figure 1). Nigra sum, sed for-mosa, filiae. Ideo dilexit me rex et introduxit me in cubiculum suum et dixit mihi. Surge, amica mea, et veni. Iam hiems transiit, imber abiit et recessit, flores apparuerunt in terra nostra. Audi caelum, verba mea, plena desiderio et perfusa gaudio.¹

Please include graphics in PDF format.

Figure 1. Figure caption.

Note that figure captions are *below* the figure. They should normally be centred — unless they are several lines long, in which case they should be left-and-right-justified.

2.2. Tables

Unlike figures, table captions are *above* the table. They should normally be centred — unless they are several lines long, in which case they should be left-and-right-justified. An example of a short caption is given in Table 1.

Table 1. Cell cycle times for the two models

On the other hand, Table 2 has rather a long caption.

2.3. A Little Longer Head Two, with Punctuation, of course

2.3.1. Followed by a Head Three

Dic, quaeso, mihi: quae est ista, quae consurgens ut aurora rutilat ut benefi-cam. Dic nam esta pulchra ut luna electa, ut sol replet laetitia terras, caelos. Maria virgo illa dulcis, praedicata de propheta porta orientalis. Tempus puta-tionis advenit. Illa sacra et felix porta, per quam mors fuit expulsa, introduxit autem vitam. Quae semper tutum est medium inter homines et deum, pro culpis remedium.

Omnes hanc ergo sequamur qua cum gratia mereamur vitam aeternam. Consequamur. Praestet nobis deus, pater hoc et filius et mater praestet nobis. Pater hoc et filius et mater cuius nomen invocamus dulce miseris solamen.

3. Environments

3.1. Description

Ui posuit fines tuos pacem, et adipe frumenti satiat te. Qui emittit eloquium suum terrae; velociter currit sermo eius.

Unnumbered list using description. Vanum est vobis ante lucem surgere: surgite postquam sederitis, qui manducatis panem doloris.

Unnumbered list. Cum dederit dilectis suis somnum.

Unnumbered list. Cce haereditas filii: merces, fructus ventris.

Nationi, et iudicia sua non manifestavit eis. Et exultavit spiritus meus in salutari meo. Quia respexit humilitatem ancillae suae, ecce enim ex hoc beatem me dicent omnes generationes. Quia fecit mihi magna qui potens est; et sanctum nomen eius.

3.2. Enumerate

Nationi, et iudicia sua non manifestavit eis. Et exultavit spiritus meus in salutari meo. Quia respexit humilitatem ancillae suae, ecce enim ex hoc beatem me dicent omnes generationes. Quia fecit mihi magna qui potens est; et sanctum nomen eius. Et misericordia eius a progenie in progenies timentibus eum. Fecit poten-tiam in brachio suo, dispersit superbos mente cordis sui.

1. Numbered list. Vanum est vobis ante lucem surgere: surgite postquam sederitis, qui manducatis panem doloris.
2. Numbered list cum dederit dilectis suis somnum.
3. Numbered list cce haereditas filii: merces, fructus ventris.

Sicut sagittae in many potentis: ita filii excussorum. Beatus vir qui implevit desiderium suum ex pisis: non confundetur cum loquetur inimicis suis in porta. Sicut erat in principio et nunc et semper, et in saecula saeculorum. Audi caelum, verba mea, plena desiderio et perfusa gaudio. 3.3. Itemize

4. Quotation

Extract sample (quotation). Vanum est vobis ante lucem surgere: surgite postquam sederitis, qui manducatis panem doloris. Praestet nobis deus, pater hoc et filius et mater praestet nobis.

Nisi custodierit civitatem, frustra vigilat qui custodit eam. Cum dederit dilectis suis somnum: ecce haereditas filii: merces, fructus ventris. Sicut sagittae in many potentis: Ita filii excussorum.
